Letter from the Chair



Dear Friends and Supporters,

2022 was a year of re-engagement and revitalization for The 1990 Institute. With the availability of vaccines and loosening restrictions amidst a slow down of the COVID-19 pandemic, there was a new energy that reverberated. Directors renewed their connections with each other in person and worked with each other, staff, and our generous partners to produce an amazing array of content in support of our mission.

In the summer, we relaunched our Teachers Workshop program in a virtual format, which exponentially broadened our reach. Across 33 states in the United States and in 16 other countries, we had over 450 registrants at our latest workshop and over 12,000 views of the recorded lectures.

In the fall, we onboarded our Executive Director, Susana Liu-Hedberg, who is leading the organization through the next decade of growth. Her extensive leadership and experience in building teams, operations, and systems as well as her unique understanding of our purpose and values give us great confidence that she will help continue The 1990 Institute's legacy of successful education programming. Already, she has worked alongside the Board at a strategy offsite in October to reaffirm the mission of the organization and refine the focus of our efforts.

We were also incredibly fortunate to receive the support of many institutional and individual donors, for whom without their generosity as well as the passion and dedication of our Directors and staff, we would not have been able to accomplish all that we had in 2022.

Yet, despite the lessening impacts of COVID-19, U.S.-China relations continue to spiral downward given the actions from both governments. Anti-China rhetoric espoused from mass media and our politicians have had a real negative impact on Asian Americans. Our community is still targeted and feeling the weight of anti-Asian discrimination and violence. Moving forward, we need systemic solutions to solve systemic problems and that includes empowering not only Asian Americans but our teachers and allies to speak out and to lead. The 1990 Institute's mission of advocating for equitable treatment of Asian Americans and a constructive U.S.-China relationship through education remains relevant and necessary.

I am grateful for your support in 2022 and look forward to continuing our work together. Education is a long game, and it is up to all of us to carry forward our collective efforts to build an inclusive future where everyone feels they belong.

2022 in Review

In 2022, The 1990 Institute continued to expand substantially from a Covid-curtailed program in 2020. We focused our programming on elevating the visibility of Asian Americans, dispelling stereotypes and prejudices against Asian Americans and people in China today, providing historical context, and changing the narrative from exclusion, negativity, and hate to inclusion, positivity, and mutual respect.

Producing content and providing tools that are reputable and balanced is imperative given the escalating tensions between the United States and China, and we will continue to target our programs to secondary school teachers, and by extension high school students and the wider community. Our work will be even more pertinent as states continue to pass legislation mandating Asian American Pacific Islander and ethnic studies in the K-12 curricula.

Our 2022 programs focused on providing teacher support through our webinars, workshops, videos, podcast series, newsletters, profiles on Asian American and allies, an essay contest, and a comprehensive, open-source Reference Library.



Teachers Workshop

Since 2013, Teachers Workshop has conducted two-day in-person seminars and webinars for secondary school teachers to learn about contemporary China. In 2020, we expanded to include education about AAPI history and culture in an attempt to combat anti-Asian discrimination in the US and in support of the nascent movement in incorporating AAPI/ethnic studies in school curricula. An essential element of the program includes small-group conversations with teachers on how to incorporate their learnings into lesson plans and discussion guides for use in classrooms nationwide.






Podcast


